THE FOUR LAST THINGS (Death, Judgment, Heaven and Hell) Meditating on these 4 Last Things helps us orient our lives to what truly matters in this world and knowing the reality of our future can help us make better choices in the present moment. With death and an afterlife in the picture, our lives have the chance to change, forcing us to consider the eternal consequences of our actions. Death: Nobody knows when we will die, but it's going to happen. So live accordingly! In the Catechism of the Catholic Church (ccc 1007) we read: "Death is the end of earthly life. Our lives are measured by time, in the course of which we change, grow old and, as with all living beings on earth, death seems like the normal end of life. That aspect of death lends urgency to our lives: remembering our mortality helps us realize that we have only a limited time in which to bring our lives to fulfillment". In death, God calls man to himself. Therefore the Christian can experience a desire for death like St. Paul's: 'My desire is to depart and be with Christ. My earthly desire has been crucified; ... there is living water in me that murmurs and says within me: Come to the Father. I want to see God and, in order to see him, I must die. I am not dying, I am entering life'". To be continued in Judgment. THE
